

Summary of *In the Absence of the Ordinary: Soul Work for Times of Uncertainty* by Francis Weller ¹

Section I — When the Bough Breaks

What Section III is doing overall: It reattaches the reader to the wider web of belonging—earth, place, mystery—so the burden of the time isn’t carried by the isolated individual self. ⁵

1) We are in a collective initiation
